The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on October 8, 2013. The following attended: Chairman Ted Lyons, Commissioners Greg King and Doug Stone, County Administrator Roxie Devers, and Clerk to the Board Corinne M. Lengel. County Attorney Stan Kimble attended in the afternoon.

Chairman Lyons called the meeting to order and asked District Three road foreman David Seymour, who was attending for the appointment at 9:00 a.m., to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

The nine o'clock appointment was running late, so Mr. Lyons asked for a correction to the minutes from the September 30, 2013, meeting that included a specific location for the counters that Road & Bridge crews were placing in District One; south of Highway 40/287 and north of County Road 2W on County Road 26. Mr. Stone made a motion to approve the minutes, as corrected.

The Board reviewed the Agreement to appoint Stan M. Kimble as County Attorney for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2014. Mr. King made a motion to sign the agreement, Mr. Stone seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

Also reviewed were notices received from the Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety concerning Lincoln County's applications to convert the Hoffman Pit from a 110 (c) to a 112 (c) pit and for a reclamation permit amendment on the Jamaco Pit.

At 9:10 a.m., Ryan Nataluk with Stantec Consulting met with the Board and the road foremen to present the inspection of county bridge reports. Chris Monks, foreman for District One, did not attend the meeting. Mr. Nataluk said there are several bridges in the county where the posted structure load capacity is low, which is also the reason why there are several structurally deficient ratings. The bridges are put into a coding scale; 9, 8, or 7 being good condition; 6 or 5 being fair condition; and 4 and below being poor condition.

Mr. Seymour asked about LIN-M-20.1, which is the bridge over Horse Creek on County Road M, which showed a sufficiency rating of 47.7 and was marked structurally deficient with a replacement cost of \$1,876,000. Mr. Nataluk said that the bridge was basically overbuilt, as the girders are too small and there are not enough of them, making the stress factor too high. The codes, which are in the fair category, reflect the condition of the materials but low load postings are what make the bridge structurally deficient. He added that the reason they include replacement costs in their bridge report is so that the county can get the bridges on the list for funding through the special highway committee if they want to go ahead and replace them, which can take up to four years. Ms. Devers explained that the county was approved for funding for three bridges but the commissioners decided it would be much cheaper for the county to take care of them rather than come up with the twenty percent match it would take to replace them. Mr. Nataluk agreed, stating that some counties find it easier and/or cheaper to replace structurally deficient bridges with low water crossings or culverts; however, the county is eligible to apply for approximately \$12 million in funding if they decide to go that route. Mr. Lyons commented that it would probably be twenty years before the county got the

money with all the recent flooding problems, but Mr. Nataluk said that FEMA is paying for the flooding, which doesn't affect the funding through the special highway committee. He added that the county can certainly do the minimum to keep the old bridges safe and open and put more county funds into the good bridges for maintenance, since most are still in great condition. Cleaning off rust, keeping abutment seats and joints clean, sealing concrete decks, and removing debris are some of the best maintenance efforts the county can perform to keep the bridges in good condition.

Mr. Nataluk said that the only action item required by the report was the load posting certification, which needed to be signed and sent in to CDOT. The bridges listed were in noncompliance and cannot accept the weight of Colorado legal trucks at operating stress levels per AASHTO and CDOT specifications. The certification listed the load posting weight restrictions for each bridge. Mr. Nataluk explained that there were no signs on some and others may need to be replaced, but they must be posted.

Three bridges were replaced with culverts since the last inspection was done, but Mr. Nataluk said they would not make the inspection list as the orientation of the pipes doesn't meet the federal definition for a culvert, so they are now considered to be minor structures. Although road crews did an excellent job of placing the pipes, the distance between them was not one-half or less the diameter of the pipe, which means Stantec will not be able to place them on the inspection list in the future. Mr. Nataluk said that some counties have their minor structures inspected every four or five years, which costs around \$500, adding that it is a good idea to do so as it helps to have an accounting of the minor structures in the major structure inventory. He added that Stantec cannot design a bridge or pipe for the county, but they will certainly answer any questions or help in any way they can, free of charge, within limitation.

Mr. Lyons asked how far upstream they would need to begin clearing brush in order to avoid it washing down and plugging up everything downstream if there was ever a flood, and Mr. Nataluk said that they should begin clearing at least 100 to 200 feet upstream from the bridge.

Mr. Lyons asked if 197 vehicles travelling on a road in a twenty-four hour period is considered to be a high amount of traffic, and Mr. Nataluk said it was high if it is a dirt road, which Mr. Lyons confirmed. Mr. Nataluk said that some counties are charging overload fees on some county roads and have put permit systems into place to help pay for damage to their roads due to the heavy loads carried over them. He offered to send the information to the commissioners. The Board thanked Mr. Nataluk and commended him on his presentation.

County Treasurer Jim Covington was unable to make his appointment at 10:00 a.m., and at 10:45 a.m., Emergency Manager John DeWitt met with the Board to discuss the results of the inspection completed by FEMA representatives on the flood damage in the southern area of the county. They want documentation of every place that the roads were scoured, washed out or otherwise damaged from the flooding, and Mr. DeWitt said that even administrative costs are covered in the declarations. He felt positive about receiving funding, especially for County Road 63, as even getting FEMA to come out seemed to be a point of optimism. There are 404

and 406 Mitigation Grants that can be applied for if approved by FEMA and inspectors believe the county will meet the threshold. Mr. DeWitt said that the county will need to repair the bridge to make it passable and safe for the public, and then when the FEMA declaration comes through they can work on funding for bridge replacement, if approved. Mr. DeWitt said that they will have another meeting if the county receives the declaration, and Ms. Devers asked him to find out whose regulations the county will need to follow.

Mr. DeWitt and the road foremen left and the Board reviewed the application submitted by Tri-County Fire Protection District to license their ambulance service. Mr. King made a motion to approve the application to license the ambulances with basic life support services, and Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

**RESOLUTION #862** It was moved by Commissioner King and seconded by Commissioner Stone to adopt the following resolution:

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the Colorado Emergency Medical Services Act, Section 25-315.101, et seq., C.R.S., the Board of County Commissioners has the authority to establish requirements for the inspection, licensure, and operation of ambulance services, ambulance personnel, and ambulance vehicles operating in the county; and

**WHEREAS**, the Lincoln County Commissioners adopted Resolution #651 and thereby established rules and regulations governing the licensure of ambulance services operating within Lincoln County; and

**WHEREAS**, the Tri-County Fire Protection District has presented the Board of County Commissioners with an application to license the ambulance service and to permit their ambulance as a basic life support vehicle; and

**WHEREAS**, upon review the Board of County Commissioners determined that the documentation presented met the rules and regulations established under Resolution #651;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County that the Tri-County Fire Protection District is hereby authorized to provide ambulance service in Lincoln County with a basic life support ambulance.

Upon roll call the vote was:

The Chairman declared the motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Covington had wanted Ms. Devers to let the commissioners know that he has issued all the Distrainment Warrants for the mobile homes discussed at the previous meeting and was contacted by one owner who intends to come in and pay the taxes. Mr. Lyons spoke up to say that he'd stopped by the landfill to speak with Mick Jaques, who told him that they could probably burn them at the landfill by the iron pile and see if Jason Brent would want to buy the scrap metal, as long as they only had one at a time and the weather conditions were ideal. He thought maybe they could destroy three or four each year. Ms. Devers said she also spoke with Patti Lell at CTSI and if the county chooses to hire someone to dismantle the mobile homes they will be required to provide their own liability insurance, as they will not be covered under the county's insurance. Mr. King said they may have a problem getting the mobile homes to the landfill and Mr. Lyons thought they might be able to hire Brents to move them, but he felt it is the county's obligation to do something with them, if at all possible.

Mr. Stone reported receiving a call on September 30 from Paul Jenkins regarding a washout, which David Seymour will fix this week. On October 1, he went by the county shop, on the Second he checked roads east and north of Karval, on the Third he met with the FEMA group and checked on more washed out roads, and on October 7 he went back to the shop again.

Mr. King reported attending the East Central Council of Governments meeting in Limon on October 2. His crew also put out the traffic counters on County Road 35, and after six days they had 744 vehicles on County Road 3X, 698 vehicles on County Road 4C, and 361 vehicles on County Road 109.

Mr. Lyons reported checking oil wells on October 4 and also speaking with Larry Don Meier. He also went by the landfill and spoke with Mick Jaques about the mobile homes, and on October 7, he traveled County Road 63 and went up north on County Road 4C and County Road 35, where he noticed more potential oil sites.

Ms. Devers reported that Julie Joffe has winterized the fairgrounds and will contact Plains Heating to come and check the heat and air conditioning. There was a leak discovered in the events building after the last rainstorm, but Ms. Joffe doesn't want to get up on the roof to look at it, so will try to see if she can get someone to do it.

The county signs an annual MOU for Control of Confidential Data with the Department of Revenue designating who is allowed to receive the local sales tax collections report. Usually it is Ms. Devers and she asked if the commissioners wanted it to continue that way, which they agreed to.

She had also received a request to pay the annual NACO dues of \$450, but stated that even though the county had become a member of the organization, they have never really received any benefits because of it. The Board agreed not to renew the NACO dues.

Ms. Devers asked if any of the commissioners plan to attend the next Eastern TPR meeting in Akron on October 21, and Mr. Stone said he intends to go.

Lastly, Ms. Devers said she would not be attending the winter conference, due to personal reasons, and has cancelled her reservation.

There was no old business, and the Board reviewed the September 2013 County Clerk and Treasurer reports, as well as the third quarter Public Trustee's report.

Mr. Kimble reported that he'd received several responses on the county list serve regarding the mobile home issue, and although he hasn't read them all yet, he believes the most important thing is that the county has the proper paperwork if Mr. Covington sells them at tax sale and the county ends up with them. Some counties felt that mobile homes are more of a liability than an asset and feel that having the county take control of them is a way for landowners to get rid of them free of charge. Mr. Lyons repeated the conversation he'd had with Mick Jaques and said again that he felt it was time the county did something about them. Mr. Kimble said that as long as they follow state statute it should be fine, and he will follow up with the Board once he finishes reading the responses, adding that doing it the simplest way possible with the least amount of expense seems to be the best idea.

At 1:30 p.m., Amy and Theron Perry met with the Board to discuss the requirement placed on Winterbergs' development permit for a junkyard that causes them to complete an annual water test on their neighbor's well. Land Use Administrator John DeWitt was also in attendance.

Ms. Perry said that they've been having John and Rhonda Clay's well water tested for over ten years with no positive results and have paid over \$2,000 for the tests. She asked the Board if they would consider waiving the requirement for future testing, based on the fact that they no longer have the existing operation that her father had when the testing was agreed to. At the time Mr. Winterberg agreed to do the testing, there were some oil spills and wrecked vehicles on the property within 500 feet of the well, but Ms. Perry said that although they do haul vehicles in, she and her husband do not crush vehicles on the property at all, and there is now grass growing all around the yard where her father once had vehicles parked. They use the area as a storage facility, not a junk yard as her father had, but Ms. Perry said it had to be permitted that way. She felt they have made a good faith effort to comply with the requirement, but her concern is that if anything ever does turn up in the well water the Perrys or Ms. Winterberg will be blamed for it. She added that it is also an imposition to the county because the Land Use Administrator has to be there every time they pull the sample from the well since they want to make sure it is done properly.

Mr. DeWitt said he'd spoken with EPA inspectors and the EPA will likely not get involved in this matter, as they would prefer the county handle it. He added that they couldn't believe the county would impose such a regulation, or that Mr. Winterberg had agreed to it in the first place, and by now any volatile organic compounds should have been absorbed and assimilated.

Mr. Kimble said the best thing to do would be to ask Mr. Clay to agree that the stipulations have been met since 2001 with no negative results. He went on to say that the commissioners could either make the decision themselves or have the Land Use Board do it, but it will ultimately be their decision anyway. He suggested contacting Mr. Clay first to see if he would be agreeable to terminating the agreement, especially since there was never an indication of how long the water would have to continue to be tested and never any negative findings. The Board agreed to have Mr. DeWitt contact Mr. Clay to see if he could solve the issue before taking it before the Land Use Board again.

Once the Perrys and Mr. DeWitt had gone, Mr. Kimble continued his report, stating that they would need to schedule a discussion regarding the CORA policy soon, adding that he had not heard anything back from any of the other elected officials. Ms. Lengel asked if the policy could be amended once it was adopted, which Mr. Kimble said it could, so they agreed to adopt it at the meeting on October 18. Mr. Kimble also said he is waiting for a response regarding the floodplain issue.

Mr. King mentioned that he'd spoken with Sheriff Nestor again about Andrew Johnson plowing up the county road, and Mr. Kimble said he would stop and speak with the sheriff as well before he left.

The commissioners approved the remaining expense vouchers for the month of September 2013.
