The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on May 7, 2014. The following attended: Chairman Ted Lyons, Commissioners Greg King and Doug Stone, County Administrator Roxie Devers, Clerk to the Board Corinne M. Lengel, and commissioner candidate Ed Schifferns. County Attorney Stan Kimble arrived at 11:00 a.m. and left at 12:20 p.m.

Chairman Lyons called the meeting to order and asked Veterans Service Officer Parker Newbanks, Jr. to lead the Pledge of Allegiance, after which Mr. Newbanks gave his report for 2013. He explained that he must send the reports in on a monthly basis in order to receive the \$100 state subsidy for the department, but he only meets with the commissioners on an annual basis since there may be months with little or no activity.

Mr. Newbanks also handed out copies of the 2012 Geographic Distribution of VA Expenditures and Mr. King asked what a unique patient is. Mr. Newbanks said it would be an individual enrolled in VA healthcare who receives treatment at a VA facility, so they are actually a patient rather than a medical contact. Mr. King also asked if the patient delays he has heard about have affected anyone that Mr. Newbanks knows, but was told that headlines tend to sensationalize a bit and there may be a plausible explanation for what he has heard. Mr. Newbanks said that he is not advocating the VA if there is indeed a problem, but some vets get a letter at the beginning of the year informing them that they may be scheduled for their annual appointment in June, which doesn't necessarily denote "not being seen."

When Mr. Newbanks had gone, Ms. Devers said that James Martin with Evergreen Systems and Technology had rescheduled for May 19, so Mr. Stone made a motion to approve the minutes from the meeting held on April 30, 2014, as submitted. Mr. King seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

The Board reviewed reports from the Treasurer's office, as well as the Colorado Wireless Interoperability Network (CWIN) Memorandum of Understanding between Lincoln County and the Governor's Office of Information Technology for the Digital Trunked Radio and microwave equipment located at the courthouse. Ms. Devers said Mr. Kimble had looked at it and said it was fine, so Mr. King made a motion to sign the MOU with the Governor's OIT, Mr. Stone seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

Mr. King reported taking the draft of the road policy to Mark McHone at the county shop after the commissioner meeting on April 30. He also commented that there was a motor vehicle accident at County Road 3U and County Road 46 on Saturday. Economic Development is working on a prospect for a new manufacturing plant in Limon that could possibly bring jobs to twenty-five people, but that was all he could say about it.

Mr. Stone also dropped off the draft of the road policy to his road foreman after the last meeting, and on May 1, he and Monty Mattson talked with workers from the company laying fiber optic cable in the area. On May 3, he checked some of the areas he had received blowing dirt complaints on, and on May 5 they used a dozer to clear away some of the dirt blown into

the ditches and Scot Oliver's fence. Mr. Stone commented that Mr. Oliver will need to remove his fence but they had to clear the dirt in order for him to get to it.

Mr. Lyons reported checking the oil wells at Forristalls on May 1. He also had a call from Landfill Manager Mick Jaques on May 3 regarding a complaint about blowing trash. Mr. Lyons contacted Sheriff Nestor to see if he had some inmates that could be taken to the landfill to help clean up the trash.

At 10:00 a.m., Public Health Director Sue Kelly met with the Board to give her monthly report and request signatures on the Core Public Health Services contract and the Tobacco grant. Ms. Kelly updated the Board on communicable diseases, immunizations, adult and child health and EPR, and then spoke a bit about the STEPP tobacco program and the hazards of e-cigarettes. Ms. Kelly also said that an MOU has never been signed between the three counties (Cheyenne, Kit Carson and Lincoln) handling the regional part of EPR because the scope of work changed so much that they weren't sure how to divide them up. Darcy Janssen was supposed to come up with a plan, but never did and now that the budgets have already been submitted, Ms. Kelly isn't sure anything can be changed at this point. However, she said that since all three counties do the same thing, she proposed that they split the funds 35%, 35%, 30% instead of .4, .4, and .2 (which is Lincoln County's portion). She has not heard anything further from either Cheyenne or Kit Carson County, though.

Ms. Kelly presented the two contracts she needed signatures for and Mr. King made a motion to approve the STEPP contract in the amount of \$33,199 for the period of July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Stone then made a motion to approve the Core Nursing contract in the amount of \$28,204 for the period of July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015. Mr. King seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Lastly, Ms. Kelly said that a nursing student from Colorado Springs who is working on her degree would like to come out and job shadow one day each week. There is no cost to the county, she would not be allowed to use the county vehicle, and Ms. Kelly said she would be sure the student signs all the confidentiality forms. She felt it would be good to have the student here since there is always a need for public health professionals in the rural areas.

After Ms. Kelly left, Ms. Devers reported that Fairgrounds Manager Julie Joffe had called to remind her of last year's problems with the Rodeo Bible Camp group who will be renting the fairgrounds again on June 10, 11, and 12. Ms. Joffe informed Ms. Devers that a wedding reception is scheduled for June 13 and asked if the commissioners could contact Alan Carr to make sure the group understands that they cannot keep their livestock in the parking area north of the Ellis Allen building. A call was placed to Alan Carr who said he understood what the commissioners were requesting and would pass the word to others in the organization. He did ask if it was still permissible to use the stalls in the buildings and was told that it would be acceptable.

At that time, Linda Ashmore and John Theisen arrived for the 11:00 meeting, but since it was only 10:30, Mr. Lyons asked Ms. Lengel to go ahead and discuss her staffing changes. Ms. Lengel said that her chief deputy would be retiring the end of July after thirty-three years of service to the county. Also, her chief election deputy has resigned effective May 16, due to an illness of a family member. Ms. Lengel said that an ad will appear in the newspaper for a bookkeeper, but at this time her current employees will absorb the workload of the election deputy and she may hire someone later in the year if she needs to.

As for the \$20 surcharge on driver's license documents issued to out-of-county residents, Ms. Lengel said that she had discussed it with the driver examiner and County Attorney Stan Kimble after the last commissioner meeting. Mr. Kimble felt the county should not be charging the surcharge while waiting for a response from the Department of Revenue, since the letter from the deputy executive director stated, "...it is not permissible for the county to charge this fee...", and Ms. Lengel said she, too, was uncomfortable with it. On the other hand, Ms. Lengel said that she didn't want to not charge the fee, and then charge it again, totally confusing people as to whether the county does or doesn't have a \$20 surcharge. Mr. Lyons said he feels they should continue to charge the surcharge, and Mr. King agreed. Ms. Lengel passed around a letter to Deputy Executive Director Heather Copp with the Department of Revenue, written by Mr. Kimble, requesting a current proposed Memorandum of Understanding, as well as "the name and phone number of the deputy attorney general with whom you are working, so that I might have a dialogue as to the statutes cited in your letter and his general position on the issue." Ms. Lengel also stated that the driver examiner will be out of the office on vacation from May 12 through May 26, so perhaps they would have a better answer when he returns.

There was no old or new business to discuss.

At 11:00 a.m., the road foremen met with the commissioners to give an update on each district's work and to discuss road policies. Land Use Administrator John DeWitt and County Assessor Jeremiah Higgins also attended the discussion.

Chris Monks reported that District One road crews have been busy grinding up the road by the microwave tower and treating it with chemicals. They hope to put down the first layer of rock next week if the weather cooperates. They have also hauled the rest of the material from the crusher to various roads within the district and they are also mowing tumbleweeds.

Gale Lukow reported that District Two crews have been doing general road maintenance as well as some patching on County Roads 109 and 63, hoping to correct the soft spots caused by oil truck traffic, as well as graveling.

District Three Foreman Monty Mattson said that his district has hauled some rotomill to the Stone Pit, have finished up where the tubes were put in from last year's flooding, and he personally has been working on completing the FEMA paperwork. They have put gravel on County Road S from Karval to County Road 63, and are crack-sealing this week. They've also been dealing with the blowing dirt issues and tumbleweeds.

Mr. Kimble commented that Tricia Hale with Limon Wind III, LLC had given him the original performance bonds for the next phase of the project, and Ms. Devers asked that he give them to Ms. Lengel to file with the original road agreements.

Discussion then ensued about the county's road policies; Mr. Kimble explaining that the commissioners would most likely not open a road on a section line unless a member of the public were to petition for it, and any cost to do so would be incurred by the petitioner.

The question arose about easements on county roads, and Mr. Lyons said that he was sure he'd read somewhere, possibly at Hedlund Abstract, that primary county roads would have a ninety foot easement and secondary roads would have a sixty foot easement. The group agreed that County Roads 2W, 109, 25, 63, and 2S were all ninety feet, but Mr. Kimble said that statute refers to a primary road is anything with a number. Mr. Stone said he wasn't sure that County Road 63 has a ninety foot easement down in the southern portion of the county, and Monty Mattson added County Roads S, T, and M to the list. Mr. Kimble said that statute dictates that the county map will designate each primary road with a number and each primary road should have a ninety foot easement. He added that some roads may be in the state system and wondered if being both a state and county road would determine whether or not it had a ninety foot easement. He will check on it and said it would be easy to correct the policy. Since statute claims that highways and roads are the same thing, he felt they would need to differentiate between what the county calls a primary road and what statute determines a primary road to be.

Mr. Higgins spoke up to say that County Roads 63 and 109 were actually designated at the time they were numbered as primary roads and did not correspond with the other road numbers on the map, and Ms. Devers put in that they were historically called 63 and 109 so they left them that way.

Mr. Kimble said that he felt all primary roads need to have at least a sixty foot easement, adding that it takes a court decree to determine if something is a public road. He will speak with Penny Wilkins at Hedlund Abstract and discuss the information Mr. Lyons spoke of regarding ninety foot easements. Ms. Devers asked if the road foremen should make lists of all the roads with ninety foot easements in their districts and Mr. Kimble said it would be helpful.

While the foremen were still there, Ms. Devers said that Barbara Green wanted to schedule a time to discuss the land use regulations, and had even proposed an evening meeting if that would be better for everyone. Ms. Devers said it might be more convenient for the Land Use Board members to meet in the evening, and since Ms. Lengel will be so busy with the Primary Election in June, she offered to take the minutes for the meeting, which was set for 6:00 p.m. on June 30.

Once everyone had gone, Mr. Kimble asked if the commissioners had read his letter to Department of Revenue Deputy Executive Director Heather Copp concerning the \$20 surcharge. He said that he doesn't believe anyone argues with the fact that the county has a

right to compensation for serving out-of-county residents, but he also hasn't found any case law that says that the county cannot do so. He added that he wants to speak with the Attorney General and asked the commissioners if they wanted him to send the letter and they agreed he should. Ms. Lengel told him that the driver examiner will be on vacation for two weeks so hopefully they will have an answer for him by the time he comes back as to whether or not to permanently discontinue the surcharge. She added that it may be time to change the way the resolution is worded and call it something else.

Due to a recent purchase of property by a county resident, Mr. Kimble said another road issue may have arisen. He will speak with the parties and see if they can come to an amicable agreement of how to handle it but he wanted the Board to be aware of the situation.

At 1:00 p.m., Attorney Dave Taussig moderated a public outreach meeting on the Arkansas Basin. Others in attendance were Betty Konarski, chair of the Arkansas Basin Roundtable, Division of Wildlife officer Warren Cummings, and Kyle Fenner, Elbert County appointee to the Arkansas Basin Roundtable.

Mr. Taussig asked if anyone knew that Colorado has a Water Plan, and when no one did, he explained that the water supply initiative was started after the 2002 drought. The primary focus was to determine water needs for the state of Colorado, and a couple of years later the basin roundtables were created and members were appointed. They were making good progress until the government announced they were going to develop a Water Plan to determine the municipal and industrial demand through the year 2050, and there are already some projects in process to meet future demands. Mr. Taussig said they created the "four-legged table" which includes: a new supply project that would bring water over from the Colorado River; conservation and reuse, which would include low-flow toilets, zero-scaping and non-tributary water; and the conversion of agricultural irrigation to satisfy municipal needs, meaning that irrigated farms would be forced to stop irrigating in order to fulfill the needs of municipalities by transferring that water to the cities. He added that they do not like this so other options such as leasing the water or fallowing the ground would be less permanent choices. Mr. Taussig also said that the Water Plan will not impact 1041 regulations and if local concerns can be solved a project may be more successful. He could not recall the fourth "leg of the table."

Mr. Lyons mentioned that they had heard about a proposed pipeline from Lamar through Elbert and Douglas counties, but Ms. Fenner said the project had met with local resistance and was put on hold, as was Rodney Preisser's Horse Creek drainage project.

Ms. Konarski commented that the roundtables are given money by the legislature each year to fund local projects, and Mr. Taussig put in that they are "out on the road" to gather the needs and concerns for water use.

Mr. King said he is mainly concerned with Karval, Haswell, and some of the other areas in the county if farmers and ranchers are told to discontinue irrigation, which will also hurt the county's tax base.

Ms. Fenner asked the Board what they are doing as commissioners for the county residents to plan for local wells dropping and wanted to know if the county is putting any policies into place. Mr. Lyons said he is dead set against more rules and regulations being put onto people by the government so is not in favor of the county doing so. He asked if farmers would be compensated for the loss of value to their property if their wells are permanently closed, and Mr. Taussig responded that there has not been a mechanism put in place for that.

Ms. Konarski spoke up and told the Board to list it on the Arkansas River Basin Roundtable Basin Implementation Plan Input Form because no one will know their concerns if they don't. Mr. Taussig said that if they can think of a project that will touch on multiple issues at once; such as, drinking water, recreational usage, and agricultural needs, there will be a much better chance of getting it approved. Ms. Konarski added that if they approve the project and give a certain amount of money but the project still needs more funding, they could also help with that. They also do infrastructure grants for reservoir reconstruction, pipelines, water towers, and other things as well. Ms. Devers asked how often applications are considered and was told they are reviewed on a monthly basis, and Mr. Taussig said that if the county did come up with a project he would be the advocate, as each project would require a member from the roundtable as its promoter.

Mr. Cummings spoke about The Playa Lakes Joint Venture (PLJV), which is a regional partnership of federal and state wildlife agencies, conservation groups, and private industry dedicated to conserving bird habitat throughout the western Great Plains, including portions of Colorado. One of the goals is to replenish the aquifer and provide a place for wildlife, which may be considered a multiple-use project. Ms. Konarski said to make sure and put down the projects so that they are part of the Water Plan, and it is most likely that they will be funded.

There were no other questions or concerns, so the group left and the commissioners approved the remaining expense vouchers for the month of April 2014.
