The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on June 5, 2015. The following attended: Chairman Greg King, Commissioners Doug Stone and Ed Schifferns, County Administrator Roxie Devers, Clerk to the Board Corinne M. Lengel, and Gary Ensign. Will Bublitz with the Limon Leader and Eastern Colorado Plainsman attended until 11:30 a.m.

Chairman King called the meeting to order and asked Lincoln County Economic Development Executive Director Troy McCue to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. McCue then gave the LCEDC report for May. He has added seven new business sponsorships since March 1, including K.C. Electric Association and Eastern Slope Rural Telephone Association in Hugo. His goal is to ensure that those businesses feel that the money they contribute is worthwhile. He has noticed that it is difficult to find people who want to commit to being board members; in fact, some have asked if they are required to be a board member if they become a contributor. There is a sponsorship that is pending and Mr. McCue hopes that person will become a board member if they decide to join LCEDC, which will give the organization a total of nine board members. They are allowed between nine and fifteen. Should they ever exceed the maximum, they have discussed holding elections. Ms. Devers asked if someone could contribute the minimum of \$100 and still be on the board, but Mr. McCue said a person couldn't be nominated until they contributed \$300. Those at the president's level receive automatic membership on the board. They have talked about fractional voting; allowing a \$300 contributor 3/10 of the vote but there was also concern that a group of small contributors could basically vote out a current board. Mr. Schifferns asked about accountability on the organization concerning audits and Mr. McCue responded that they could certainly request an external audit if the commissioners wanted them to, but he felt very confident that Linda Hawthorne does an excellent job with the LCEDC financials. He added that they are interested in LCEDC being transparent and fair, and Mr. King put in that they do not want the organization to become Limon economic development, but a countywide economic development.

Mr. McCue addressed the fact that Arriba, Genoa, and Hugo do not have zoning regulations, which is why large businesses interested in locating in the county consider the town of Limon first. Mr. Ensign stated that the town of Hugo has had zoning regulations in place since the 80's, although there have been questions concerning the particular uses of specific zones. Mr. McCue said he had misunderstood the information from the past director, Lisa Nolder, and Ms. Devers said that the town of Hugo had been discussing the Uniform Building Code with Ms. Nolder. Mr. McCue said he would speak with the town's mayor, Patsie Smith, and Mr. Ensign stated that he thought the town had decided against adopting the UBC because of cost and enforcement issues, but he wasn't certain.

Weed Coordinator Wayne Shade stopped by with a quote from Norstar Industries, Inc. on a new weed sprayer, stating that the total cost, including new computers and software, would be \$40,279 without the trade-in of the old sprayer. He still did not know how much they would give the county for the old one, as the gentleman who could tell him that is on vacation. Since it will take approximately three months to build the new one, Mr. Shade said he could finish out the season with the old sprayer as long as they can keep the electrical system running, if the commissioners decide to purchase a new one. He is still having problems with the alarms and

said that it would cost around \$10,000 to have the electrical system rewired. He will let the Board know when he finds out how much Norstar will give in trade for the sprayer he has now.

Land Use Administrator/OEM Director John DeWitt met with the Board at 10:00 a.m. to present the Lincoln County Emergency Operations Plan, the Lincoln County Pre-disaster Mitigation Plan, and the 2006 International Residential/Building Code for adoption.

First, Mr. DeWitt asked if the commissioners had received the information he sent via email regarding the Connie Devlin case and if they were amenable to allowing her to haul her trash off as she accumulates a pick-up load. Mr. King said that as long as the area is fenced and she makes an attempt to keep it clean, they will allow the practice.

Mr. DeWitt also asked the Board to think about state resource ordering, as he can get just about anything as an emergency manager. He wanted to know if the commissioners wanted to place a cap on what could be spent, as he could obtain an incident management team, spotter planes, or any number of things to be used in a disaster situation. The commissioners agreed that if there were ever an imminent threat and he needed to order something immediately he could do so, but otherwise he would need Board approval.

Mr. DeWitt said that amendments were made to the Emergency Operations Plan and asked if it appeared to be acceptable. Mr. King said he had limited knowledge of such things and added that as long as those who deal with emergency operations on a daily basis approved it, he felt it was fine. Mr. Schifferns made a motion to adopt the Lincoln County Emergency Operations Plan, as amended. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Every five years, FEMA requires adoption of a resolution of a pre-disaster mitigation plan. Without it, the county could not even apply for disaster funding. Mr. DeWitt stated that FEMA has accepted Lincoln County's plan as-is; however, the commissioners would need to adopt it via resolution. Once the county has done so, the towns of Limon, Hugo and Arriba will have to sign off on it. Mr. King asked about Genoa, but Mr. DeWitt said the town of Genoa was not included for some reason. Limon Town Administrator Dave Stone has asked for some inclusions but, as long as the body of the Plan does not change, action items—or jurisdictional improvements—can be made at any time. Ms. Devers asked if this plan is updating the county's current plan, which it is.

Mr. Stone made a motion to adopt a resolution approving the Lincoln County Pre-disaster Mitigation Plan. Mr. Schifferns seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION #908 It was moved by Commissioner Stone and seconded by Commissioner Schifferns to adopt the following resolution:

PRE-DISASTER MITIGATION PLAN

WHEREAS, Lincoln County, with assistance from the Lincoln County Office Of Emergency Management Director, has gathered information and prepared the Lincoln County Pre-Disaster Mitigation Plan; and,

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Pre-Disaster Mitigation Plan has been prepared in accordance with FEMA requirements at 44 C.F.R. 201.6; and,

WHEREAS, Lincoln County is a local unit of government that has afforded the citizens an opportunity to comment and provide input in the Plan and the actions in the Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners has reviewed the Plan and affirms that the Plan will be updated no less than every five years;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners that the Lincoln County Pre-Disaster Mitigation Plan be adopted as this jurisdiction's Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan, and resolves to execute the actions in the Plan.

Lastly, Mr. DeWitt informed the Board that the county currently operates under the 1997 International Residential Code and International Building Code and he is only certified for the 2006 IRC/IBC, although there are 2009 and 2012 Codes as well. Mr. King wanted to know why the county wouldn't update to one of those more current codes, but Mr. DeWitt said it had to do with sprinkler systems being installed in homes. The 2009 and 2012 regulations require that homes be equipped with sprinkler systems for fire prevention. Mr. Schifferns asked if he had any concerns with adopting the 2006 Code and Mr. DeWitt responded that there are several items covered by state regulations; such as, electrical, plumbing, and termite inspection so he had no problems with adopting the Code.

Mr. Schifferns made a motion to adopt a resolution adopting the 2006 International Residential/Building Code. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

2006 INTERNATIONAL/RESIDENTIAL BUILDING CODE ADOPTION RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Lincoln County has adopted and currently uses the 1997 Universal Building Code, and

WHEREAS, codes are updated every three years, and

WHEREAS, Lincoln County needs to update to the 2006 International/Residential Building Code, and

WHEREAS, the current building inspector’s certification coincides with the 2006 International/Residential Building Code.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County that the 2006 International /Residential Building Code is hereby adopted and said code is effective immediately upon adoption of this resolution.

Once Mr. DeWitt had gone, Mr. Stone made a motion to approve the minutes from the meeting held on May 29, 2015, as submitted. Mr. Schifferns seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Ms. Devers asked that the Board wait to sign the GPA and GPE, Inc. d.b.a. Gravity Play Events contract for a Kid’s Bounce House and an Adrenaline Rush Obstacle Course at the county fair until she obtained clarification on a paragraph added to the contract after their previous review of it. The revised contract included information regarding the county providing electricity for the operation of the events, or an additional fee if the company is required to bring generators.

The Board reviewed notification from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs, Division of Property Taxation, regarding a pending application for property tax exemption for property located at 245 “E” Avenue, Limon, Colorado, owned by Your Community Foundation. The property in question is the Limon Theatre.

Mr. King called for commissioner reports and Mr. Stone reported checking roads on May 30. They are drying out and are looking much better after being worked by Carson Kravig. Mr. Stone attended CCI conference from June 1 through June 3, stating that it didn’t seem to be as informative as it had in the past. There was quite a bit of discussion regarding history. They discussed agricultural land valuations and the elected official salary increase at the Eastern District meeting. Most attendees didn’t really know yet how they would handle the new

legislation in regard to the salary increases. On June 4, Mr. Stone talked with Monty Mattson and they will meet with someone from Pioneer Drilling next Monday to discuss roads. They also hired Mark Newman on the road crew.

Mr. Schifferns reported checking roads on June 1, adding that County Road 3E is getting better as it dries out and the road crew can work on it. County Road 63 from 3E to I-70 is torn up and will be graded. On June 2, he called Chris Monks to discuss roads. They finished chip sealing the curve on County Road 2W on June 4. He and Chris discussed the fact that District I will help with roads in District 3 if Monty needs assistance.

Mr. King reported attending the COG meeting in Limon on June 3. DOLA requested bringing the east end of El Paso County into the regional broadband planning project, which will provide additional administrative funding for COG. They will approve the CEDS plan on June 29, and Mr. King mentioned a broadband internet survey that can be taken, which will help identify the needs of businesses and private homes in regard to internet services. On June 3, the road crew finished grinding up the asphalt on County Road 109 north of Genoa, and on the Fourth they patched holes on County Road 63 and County Road 109. There are several places that need gravel and one resident asked specifically that the old highway be graveled. Mr. King reported that, overall, the roads are holding up pretty well after all the rain.

Ms. Devers had several requests for county credit card changes and Mr. Stone made a motion to increase Will Garlow's credit limit to \$1,500, and to issue a county credit card with a \$1,500 limit to Andrea Hendricks, and one to Gary Ensign with a \$3,000 limit. Mr. Schifferns seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

After several phone conversations with Landfill Manager Mick Jaques, Ms. Devers and Mr. Ensign composed new landfill rates, adding several items discussed at the previous meeting. Included was verbiage concerning primary business location. Number 7 was added to the list as well: Wind turbine blades must be cut into no larger than three foot squares and will be charged \$144 for a 20-yard roll-off dumpster and \$200 for a 30-yard roll-off dumpster.

Mr. Schifferns made a motion to approve the new landfill rates and regulations, effective June 5, 2015. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried with Mr. King and Mr. Schifferns voting in favor and Mr. Stone voting against. Mr. Stone stated he still has a problem with the fact that the wind towers are located in Lincoln County and someone with a business in the county should be allowed to dispose of them without further restrictions. Mr. Schifferns commented that it would be nice if they could be recycled somehow.

Mr. King asked Mr. Schifferns if he had asked Kevin Stansbury about the emergency exchange of medical records between the hospital and Peak Vista, but Mr. Schifferns said he had forgotten about it and would try to get in touch with Mr. Stansbury.

Ms. Devers stated that Bill Rusher has to update the Public Health Emergency Plan and needs to know who the county would like to name as the PIO since Ms. Devers will be leaving soon. The

Board agreed that Gary Ensign would be the logical choice and Ms. Devers said it will require training for a couple of days.

As for old business, Mr. Schifferns asked about the status of the window coverings on the roundhouse and Ms. Devers stated that not only had they not been put back, but Spectrum will not do it because it wasn't included in their contract. She believes they have ordered the wood, however, and has heard no more concerning the warranty. She was told it would take ninety days for the wood to dry once it is delivered, so it will be at least six to nine months before the new windows are in. In the meantime, the county is once again in violation of the town of Hugo's Attractive Nuisance Ordinance. Ms. Devers was concerned with how to put the coverings back on when there is nothing to nail or screw them into now that the window frames are gone. A call was placed to John Mohan to ask him to look at the north side of the building and find out how those coverings were fastened after the wall blew down.

The Board reviewed the May Assessor's and Treasurer's reports and further information regarding the additional events for kids at the county fair. Ms. Devers said the county could use the company's generators for \$125 per day and they were told they would probably need two. She called Chris Monks to ask about using the county's generators but they decided it would probably be easier to use the company's since they would have to operate them. The company also asked for volunteers to help unload and load the equipment and the commissioners agreed that the road crews could help.

When the meeting reconvened at 1:00 p.m., John Mohan said he had checked on the roundhouse and the window coverings on the north side were screwed into the brick. Mr. King asked if the fence goes all the way around the building and was told that it does, which at least helps with keeping people out. After some discussion, Mr. Mohan said they could possibly build some type of frame on the inside of the window and overlap the plywood to sandwich it in. Mr. Ensign added that since the windows are so large, the project will definitely require a crew of some kind to complete it. The Board asked Mr. Mohan to see if he could get an estimate for the materials, since his suggestion seemed to be the only viable option, as they definitely do not want to damage the brick by attaching the window coverings to it.

LaRay Patton stopped in to request that the Ranch Rodeo be given a reduced rate for the fairgrounds for their event at the end of the month, as has been done in the past. Mr. Schifferns made a motion to allow the Ranch Rodeo to pay \$700 for the use of the entire fairgrounds for their event on June 26, June 27, and a portion of June 28, and to pay a \$1,000 deposit. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Ms. Devers had received another email from GPA & GPE, Inc. concerning the contract, but still felt the information was unclear. She will contact the woman who sent the email and discuss it with her.

The commissioners approved the remaining expense vouchers for the month of May 2015.
